
WHAT IS NEW URBANISM?



Several towns and cities, including Newcastle and Lake Macquarie (NSW), Midland (WA), and Waitakere (NZ) are already adopting New Urbanism as the basis of their strategic planning. New Urbanism also underlies the Western Australian Liveable Neighbourhoods Community Design Code. Projects are under construction across the two countries and many more are in the planning stage. Developers are also finding that New Urbanist designs have potential for both a better product and higher financial returns.

NEW URBANISM -

AN EXPANDING ALLIANCE TO SOLVE THE PROBLEM OF **SPRAWL**

> The key challenge to Australian and New Zealand cities as they confront the 21st Century, is urban sprawl. New suburbs have become anonymous. Environmental and social costs are escalating. Excessive travel demands and car dependence degrade quality of life, increase roading costs and land take, and increase emissions of greenhouse gases. Insufficient

local employment forces longer commuting to work. Newly-built environments are poorly suited to the challenges of the global economy, and some estates risk negative equity.

New Urbanism in Australia and New Zealand is providing practical answers to the challenge of sprawl.

There is now broad - though far from universal recognition that the problems of our cities and suburbs must be solved, and that the planning and design of our cities impact every aspect of public and private life. Local councils, community activists, academics, developers, environmentalists, and all kinds of policy-makers are beginning to recognise the destructive nature of car-dependant urban sprawl and conventional suburban development.

The New Urbanism is a reaction to sprawl. New Urbanism in Australia and New Zealand is providing its own innovative and practical answers to the challenge of sprawl, some of which are recognised as amongst the best in the world. New Urbanism and many other recent environmental, social and economic initiatives towards walkable mixed use communities are mutually-supportive, although they are not necessarily identified under the same banner.

THE FIRST NEW URBANISM CONGRESS

A group of New Urbanist practitioners have come together to host the first Australian and New Zealand Congress from 26th to 29th April 2001, in Melbourne. The Congress aims to share knowledge and experience with New Urbanism across the two countries, and to further the understanding,

> influence and practice of New Urbanism amongst a broader audience.

New Urbanist designs have potential for both a better product and higher financial returns.

The first two days (26-27th April) will be an open conference where New Urbanist principles, activities and projects are presented and discussed. The second phase (28-29th April) will be a limited numbers' in-depth workshop for current practitioners, developers and regulators. Tours of Melbourne projects will be run on the 28th April for those not attending the workshop.

New Urbanist approaches to urban extensions, fixing existing places, main street-based town centres, mixed use development, traffic management and much more will be shared with a panel of national and international speakers. The Congress will appeal to those who have either an interest in, or who already practice New Urbanism. Student attendance is welcomed

Will Fleissig is a developer, urban planner and architect based in Denver, USA. He directed a comprehensive city rezoning for the City of Boulder. Will has also taught urban design and development courses at the University of Colorado, UC Berkeley, UCLA, USC and at Harvard's Graduate School of Design.



A choice of two Melbourne tours are offered to those not attending the weekend In-depth Workshop

Tour A: NEW INFILL PROJECTS

Melbourne has an excellent variety of virtually completed projects on large-scale infill sites relatively close to the City Centre. Most of these have been done by leading national developers, who have used New Urbanist designs to create walkable, dense mixed use communities that are wellintegrated with their surrounding neighbourhoods. This tour will visit the following projects:

Beacon Cove, Port Melbourne, (Mirvac). A 30ha project with over 900 dwellings, live-work apartments, a waterfront commercial square with a tram terminus and Tasmanian ferry port, gym, medical centre, child care and an extraordinary small supermarket/deli/café fronting the tram

Kensington Banks/Lynch's Bridge, Kensington (Urban **Pacific).** A 70ha former saleyards and abbatoir site demonstrating dense terrace housing, effective use of rear lanes and mews with studio dwellings, excellent incorporation of trees and timber work from the past and a neighbourhood centre linked to a main arterial. Housing construction has been largely limited to six preferred

Waterford Green, Maribyrnong, (Lend Lease). A 43ha former munitions factory site on the Maribyrnong River has rapidly developed into a 550 unit housing development with a mixed use precinct. It demonstrates a very diverse range of housing types, together with the streetscape benefits of rear lanes and the benefits of typical New Urbanist street types.

Tour B: REVITALISED CENTRES TOUR

New Urbanism can learn much from good traditional urbanism and Melbourne has a strong legacy of traditional main-street based shopping centres. Many of these have been revitalised over the last 15 years, in part under various programs such as the District Centres Program, Townscape Advisory Service, Main Street and StreetLife Programs, Pride of Place or Urban Villages concepts. This tour will visit several of these centres to discuss not only the revitalisation process, but also to explore the spin-off benefits that strong local centres can have for housing intensification, public transport patronage, tourism, business establishment and community spirit.

Several of these centres have so successfully embraced the 'café society' that new challenges are emerging in terms of how to control further restaurant development, parking demand, loss of convenience retail and conflicts with residential intensification. Some Councils are now striving to energise a range of centres throughout their municipality based on the Urban Village concept of having a walkable node within walking distance of most households.

This tour will include most of the following centres: Lygon St, Carlton; Brunswick St, Fitzroy; Acland St, St. Kilda; Station St, Fairfield; Puckle St, Moonee Ponds and Anderson St, Yarraville. It will also visit the City of Moreland to explore their Urban Villages growth management strategy.

Mike is the planner responsible for the Ellenbrook New Town (WA), Belvidere at East Perth (WA). Innisfail at Point Cook (Vic), and Hope Island Resort (QLD), all in various stages of construction. Mike is a firm advocate of the formation of multi-disciplinary and collaborative design teams to provide the highest level of service and practical design solutions for the land development industry.

EVAN JONES

Evan is Director of Urban Design and Major Places, Ministry For Planning WA. He has been principally responsible for the direction of the state's planning approaches towards New Urbanism and sustainable growth management. He initiated the Liveable Neighbourhoods Community Design Code, and continues to shape its refinement and implementation. He has also catalysed the revitalisation of established urban centres, using New Urbanism as a basis for restructuring them to better meet the needs of the Post-Industrial Economy and to improve their ability to support public transport.

Chip is an architect and founding Director of Ecologically Sustainable Design, an urban design and planning consultancy specialising in New Urbanism, and practising across Australia and internationally. Chip is a joint author with Wendy Morris of Mixed Use Developments: New Designs for New Lifestyles. Chip introduced the charrette process to Australia in 1992. Before moving from USA to Australia in 1994, he was the Director of the affiliated West Coast Office of Duany Plater-Zyberk. He has been Project Manager for ESD's recent projects in Waitakere (NZ), Midland (WA) and Tullimbah Village (NSW).

ANN MAGEE

Ann is Director of Strategic Projects for Waitakere City (175, 000), the western third of Greater Auckland, New Zealand, Since 1992 Ann has played a key role in the design implementation of Waitakere's sustainable development strategy, "from edge city to eco-city", based on Agenda 21 and New Urbanism. The core ingredients include Council as an active change agent; intensive, collaborative, designbased engagement with developers and the community; and the formation of a Council-owned commercial development company, Waitakere Properties, to lead innovative practice in a conservative market. As a consequence, formerly struggling town centres have seen significant increases in medium density housing, retail and commercial activity, as well as in Council-generated civic and amenity investments.

KOBUS MENTZ

Kobus Mentz is the Urban Design Manager for Sinclair Knight Merz, Auckland, New Zealand. He has had a significant influence in achieving more cohesive and sustainable patterns of development in New Zealand, including the design of the first two mixed density demonstration projects and a new town for 50,000 people in Auckland. He has written Medium Density And Mixed Use Design Guidelines for three city councils and has undertaken a significant amount of facilitation aimed at reconciling developer interests with social and environmental needs. He has previously undertaken projects in the UK, Australia and Africa and has lectured at universities including the Joint Centre for Urban Design, Oxford where he took a post graduate degree.

WENDY MORRIS

Wendy is a Director of Ecologically Sustainable Design, an urban design and planning consultancy specialising in New Urbanism for both urban extensions and urban regeneration. Based in Melbourne, ESD practises across Australia and internationally.
